Elections Qualifications for Voting

Grace's 2024 Annual Meeting will focus on expressing gratitude to God for faithfulness through the past year, and to those who have served in leadership whose terms of service are expiring.

The primary business of Annual Meeting is to elect leaders to serve the Church & School. Our election for the Church will be a vote to elect one Vestry member to fulfill Brian Rockhold's unfinished term and 2 members of the Vestry to serve a three-year term through to Annual Meeting in 2027, 4 delegates to represent Grace at Diocesan Council, and 3 members of the School Board. Those elected will officially begin their terms upon election at Annual Meeting.

All those who call Grace home are welcome to attend the Annual Meeting.

Individuals at least 16 years of age, who are "enrolled confirmed communicants in good standing" of the Parish, are entitled to "vote for members of the Vestry and upon all questions requiring the action of the Congregation."

Please note that an "enrolled confirmed communicant in good standing" is defined in the Canons of The Episcopal Church. This person is confirmed or received by a Bishop of The Episcopal Church and has "for the previous year been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and has been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God" (From The Episcopal Church, 2018 Constitution and Canons, Title III.2.2).


Natalia Maradiaga



2023 Financial Report & 2023 Budget—Gail Keller, Treasurer

As we enter 2024, we can take a deep beath and realize that we have achieved so much during this transition time. Even with our pledge receipts not meeting our goal, we generously donated \$6217.00 to BIM along with regular food drives. We started Grace to Go 2.0 and have successfully funded and helped people "get by" until they could get to a food bank. We had a pumpkin patch and raised funds with little outlay of cash. We have continued our wonderful music that has become a solid part of our worship.

We did not meet our pledge goal for 2023. We received pledges in the amount of \$167,478.00 but had a pledge goal of \$176,200. However, in 2023, our non-pledge receipts were significantly higher than we budgeted. In 2023 we budgeted \$25,000.00 and received \$41,597.57 for non-pledge receipts.

For 2024, our income from the school is now based on a more equitable agreement and is in keeping with how other churches and schools address their combined ministry. The school will be paying a set fee for use of classrooms and parish hall during the week. We will now be paying 10% of utilities and insurance and Mario will be a full-time employee of the school, rather than our sexton. Maintenance and repairs will be addressed as they come up. We will be having an inspection of all our mechanical equipment so we will understand how everything stands and if we need to be aware of anything major that could happen that we will need to address.

As you all know, Salem Lutheran is no longer using our facility. With the loss of their rental income, we saw our 2023 rental income line come in way under our budgeted number. In 2024, we plan to get a farmer's market organized for local vendors and plan to hold that in our West Bellfort parking lot on Saturdays. The vestry has also approved a rental agreement for our Parish Hall for outside events, which again, should generate additional income. Our spring and Christmas Teas also generate income; however, it is logistically beyond our ability to have a rummage sale right now.

To date, we have commitments of \$8,250.00 to help the cost of our music ministry since our Music Grant will be ending in June 2024.

Looking at the 2024 budget, you will see that we do not have a balanced budget. Since we are in transitional period, many of the numbers you see are an educated guess. We do not know how much longer Rev. Leah will be with us and when the Curate Grant will end. We do know that it will end in June 2024, but should she accept a position prior to that, the grant will, of course, only be paid through her last day. We do not know how long we will have Rev. Wendy with as our Interim Rector. We do not know exactly what we will be paying a Rector and what a salary, housing allowance, payroll taxes, etc., will be. We know we will have expenses related to the search, but we can only guess what these expenses will be.

We had \$176,000.00 in pledge commitments for 2024. This means we will need \$14,583.00 per month to meet our pledge goal. It is important for all of us, if possible, to meet the goal we have set to continue the ministries and mission of Grace.

We can be very proud of how far we have come financially as a Parish. We have been able to financially support our church and the ministries that make us who we are. And, we have done that during a major change in leadership.

Thank you. I often say, "onward and upward" and I believe that does describe who we are and where we are going.

This year we really need each member to contribute what they can financially to cover these additional one-time expenses.

This is an element of planning for the future where our parish is behind many congregations of a similar size and age. Interim Rector's Report for Annual Meeting 2024

This year has been one of change and transitions at Grace. The Rev Scott Painter left in March to serve a church in Portland, Oregon after helping Grace to grow into parish status in 2022. Moving from mission to parish status is a huge accomplishment! Grace is now learning how to continue to follow the Spirit's guidance and grow as a parish even in the midst of a Rector transition.

Rev Leah Wise is completing her second year as our curate, which means that she is actively interviewing for her next call as a priest in Christ's church. As a curate she cannot stay at Grace as much as we would like her to remain here with us. Rev Leah did an incredible job keeping everything going for two months after Rev Scott left for Oregon. That experience will help her in her future call. In the meantime, she continues to be a blessing to all of us at Grace with her administrative, pastoral, sacramental, music and teaching skills. She also serves as the School Chaplain and leads the children in worship and song each week. Thank you, Leah, for all that you do for Grace!

I arrived as Interim Rector in June and it has been a privilege and a joy to travel this transition time with all of you at Grace. As Colin Dunham, the Senior Warden will tell you the search committee is in place and we can now begin the active process of finding a Rector for Grace. This is an incredible church that truly is inclusive and welcoming. As we listened to new and old members tell their stories during our Stewardship Program this fall it is the love of Christ manifested through each of you that continues to help Grace to grow as One Body of Christ in our diversity. We have new families with young children as well as new members of more mature years, should I say? Grace now includes members from many different denominations, races and cultures, as well as being LBGT+ affirming. This diversity is an asset in seeking a new Rector. The Search Committee will keep the Vestry and congregation updated on the search process as we move through this winter and spring.

One example of our church's diversity is the Noon Hispanic Service. Under the guidance and spiritual leadership of Padre Montes, Grace is able to offer a Spanish Eucharist for our community. They have baptized several new members just since I've been at Grace. This is a much-needed service for our community. If you have not attended this service please do!

The music at Grace is exceptional! With the assistance of a music grant from the Diocese the music program has grown and provided a wonderful avenue for people outside the church to experience Grace's hospitality. Several new members are here because they first experienced Grace through the music of Paul English and our musicians. This is the third year of the music grant which will expire in June.

I asked John Graham to create Friends of Music at Grace to ensure that the music will continue to be financially supported after the grant expires. He has stepped forward and with the help of the committee is securing the financial support from all of you at Grace that is needed to grow and expand the music ministry at Grace into the foreseeable future.

I had not experienced a church with a school before coming to Grace, so being the Chair of the School has been a learning experience for me. The school under the leadership of Caitlin Powell has grown and is now out of room with our current facilities. This is an area that the new Rector and the Vestry will have to explore in the coming year. The entire building is in use everyday from 6:00am-6:00pm with the sounds of children learning and being cared for by teachers and staff passionate about their work. The School serves our neighborhood with infant care through age 4. We are one of the few places in this area that takes very young infants so there is a high demand for this type of care which only Grace is providing to our neighbors.

One issue that has arisen is that over the past few years the school was paying all of the maintenance and utility costs for both the church and the school. While it made the church's finances look better it was not a sustainable arrangement. With the termination of COVID funds to the school this year the financial situation had to be addressed. Talking with the Head of Episcopal Schools for Texas, Caitlin, Colin and myself with the approval of the vestry determined that the school and church will be having a 80/20 split to cover the maintenance of our facility. It was also determined that there should be a financial committee for the school that works with the school treasurer to oversee the school finances. This is a requirement for accreditation of the school. Accreditation of the school will need to happen once a new Rector is in place.

So moving forward in 2024 there will be a financial committee for the school which will meet with the church's financial committee several times during the year to discuss the finances together. This will help with future budgeting and transparency in the finances of both the school and the church. Caitlin Powell and I are updating the Shared Ministry Agreement to reflect the changes in the school and church agreement so that strong and healthy relationships will continue at Grace for the benefit of our community.

Grace is truly a blessing for this neighborhood. The joy that we experience each Sunday as we gather as Christ's church in this place is reflected by our engagement with our neighbors. The Spirit is calling Grace to grow in new and unimagined ways as we go through this time of transition. Please continue to pray for each other, our church and the world in this coming year as we live out the unconditional and reconciling love of God with generous hospitality, inspired worship and inclusive community.

The goal of a curacy is to engage new priests in a comprehensive training process. We are encouraged to try our hand at basically everything so in our future roles we have the experience, humility, and courage to do the work of the church without faltering.

In 2023, all the trying of the previous year was put to good use as Grace was faced with a Rector transition. I remember that first week after Rev. Scott left, right after Easter, when I wasn't sure how we were going to hold it all together. There was so much work to do. So many things to plan, tasks to delegate, sermons to preach, lessons to learn. The only way through it was to do it. So, thanks to our Vestry, lay leaders, office staff, local clergy, and the whole congregation, we kept putting one foot in front of the other. After the year Grace has had, I have learned that I can try all I want, but actually doing it takes all of us.

Last year, we tried new things, welcomed visitors who became family, celebrated as over a dozen people were baptized, grew both our 10 am and 12 pm services, unloaded a gazillion pumpkins, shared in our trials, illnesses, and griefs, clapped, laughed, ate good food, and showed up even when we didn't know exactly what to expect. We practiced being honest and optimistic at the same time.

In my role as your Curate, I rolled with the punches, made lots of spreadsheets, laughed and cried my way through workdays, practiced non-anxious presence, led a DOK retreat, sang with the musicians, baptized kids and adults in English and Spanish, facilitated at diocesan events, and attended the Hispanic Lay Leaders Conference.

In 2023, I reckoned with the reality that the work of following Jesus is primarily one of opening your hands to embrace whatever and whoever meets you on the road. Put another way, it's the hardest and most wonderful thing any of us can do. And guess what? We're doing it. Not always and not perfectly. But because we are trying, and because we are together, Christ is with us, too.

Junior Warden's Report

The Junior Warden represents the Laity as the third senior officer in the line of progression in the governance of a parish. They serve to assist the Priest and represent the Senior Warden in their absence.

We at Grace Episcopal Church enjoy a beautiful campus. It is the responsibility of the Junior Warden to coordinate the upkeep of the building and grounds of our site. We the vestry decided to adopt a slogan "IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING." Thanks all of you who came forward with all your input on things that I did not see or consider, i.e., city responsibilities abutted to our property (311 reporting to city), meditational and community gardens.

Our sexton, Mario, has been instrumental in completing some of the projects around our campus, particularly, the mold abatement, duct and register cleaning/replacement. His job description is now being redefined. We may have to schedule more workdays and/or contract more third parties to do work where necessary. We do not know exactly how this change will affect us overall.

The third parties that we brought in were for (1) rehanging front security gate, (2) repairing leak in sanctuary near sacristy, (3) remove and replace hot water heater (boiler), (4) repair leaks in women and men's rooms, (5) horticulturist for meditation garden, (6) locksmiths to replace lock cylinders, (7) underground leak detection units/repairs, (8) mold abatement services, (9) re-installing parking lot lighting, (10) window washers, (11) lawn mowing service, (12) HVAC services.

Third party services can be expensive. We must consider preventative maintenance as a method of keeping some of the high dollar items at a minimum. Just to reiterate, "IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING."

Our building has been around for a long time and is in decent shape, however the Diocese is sending a building inspector to help us. He will report back to the Diocese with suggested repairs and whether are not Grace Church is eligible for extra funding to make the suggested repairs.

I thank all of you for allowing me to serve you as Jr. Warden.

Grace had steady, strong enrollment all year and even added 7 new students this January. We have been working on 14 staff getting their CDA (child development associate), enhancing continuing education and professional development, and learning best practices in education. Our staff is more informed, organized, and collaborative after hard work in 2023! The school board and vestry have made plans to have a more cohesive relationship to ensure a well-run program.

We have created a more streamlined admissions and enrollment process, adding both Intent to Re-Enroll earlier in the school year and admission play dates. We've added an enrichment program that includes music, move and groove, art, and science to our student's daily schedule. We have done a budget overhaul to find ways to further financially assist the church and work towards paying our teachers a living wage. We have created a room parent program that will eventually become a full-fledged PTO.

We have worked hard and continue to improve our parent and staff communication and clarified and simplified policies and expectations across the board. We are also working to create a scope and sequence and school wide curriculum to further enhance our academic program.

It has been a wonderful first year as Grace Episcopal School's Head of School. I want to thank the wonderful teachers, my incredible administrative team, and the students and families for making this a fun, energetic, educational year. I'm excited for the year ahead and all the ways we can make Grace even stronger!

Friends of Grace Church Music Committee

On Sunday, December 3, 2023, the Chair of Friends Grace Music Committee, John Graham, and members of the Committee met for the first time. Committee members are C.L. Johnson, Philip Montgomery, Gabriela "Gaby" Austgen, Araceli Johnson, Peter Keolling, and Lauren Johnson.

All agreed Grace Church's musicians and singers, under the leadership of Paul English, were a vital part of the ministry of Grace Episcopal Church and that we need the support of every member of Grace Church if we wanted to keep the music ministry. Peter Koelling said: "I believe our music ministry is a major reason our church has remained stable during this transition time as we search for a new rector." Everyone agreed.

The problem Grace Church faces is that a grant from the Diocese of Texas will end in June and the grant has decreased annually and will only be \$20K in 2024. An additional \$25K is needed to maintain our music ministry which has been a unique blessing to us all.

Among the musicians are Paul English, noted composer and Jazz performing artist, who has brought together a remarkable team of musicians and singers. Among them are Barrett Sills, first Chair Celloist for the Houston Ballet and Houston Grand Opera; Horace Alexander Young III, who is an incredible musician (Saxophone and Flute), and vocal soloist; Kate Moore, an outstanding violinist and former member of Houston Ballet and Grand Opera; and Rob Erickson, drummer. In addition, our singers include Brady Weldon, beloved baritone who recently received his master's degree in music; Lindsey Weissman, who currently studies opera at the Moore School of Music at the University of Houston, and Mitzi Coleman, a talented alto and longtime parishioner.

Notably, several of our musicians and singers serve voluntarily and receive no payment. And, all of our musicians and singers have expressed their love for serving at Grace Church week after week. They trust that members of the church have been blessed by their ministry and will want to support the Music Ministry at Grace in Houston.

On December 10, 2023, John Graham presented the challenge to the church -- every member of the church was invited to pledge to give to keep our musicians and singers at Grace church. The response was an enthusiastic demonstration of great appreciation for our musicians and singers.

In order to keep our musicians and singer team together, every member of the church will need to personally make a contribution to the Music Ministry Fund at Grace. As of January 14, 2024 a total of \$ 19,700 has been pledged. Another \$10,000 is needed to fully fund our music ministry.

This amount pledged so far is a major step by a small number of individuals to keeping our music ministry; however, every member of Grace Church needs to contribute to our Music Ministry Fund. The amount of each contribution is not as important as that all members of the parish participate and demonstrate they are truly a "friend" of the music ministry at Grace Church.

The Worship Ministry at Grace Episcopal Church includes Lectors, Intercessors, and Eucharistic Ministers (EMs).

- **Acolytes:** Altar servers must be in the 5th grade or above to serve at our parish. These young people serve at weekend Masses, reconciliation services, and other liturgical celebrations, such as Stations of the Cross. Adults usually serve daily morning Mass. So, this is the one ministry that is open to persons of all ages!
- **Eucharistic Ministers:** A Eucharistic Minister is a lay person authorized to administer the chalice at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist.
- **Intercessor:** An intercessor is one who prays an intercessory prayer. The term indicates one who leads the Prayers of the People, which are prayers of intercession.
- Lector: The office of Reader, or Lector, is among the oldest, if not the oldest of liturgical lay ministries. Lectors proclaim the readings of the scripture during the celebration of the Mass and read the general intercessions.
- **Ushers:** Ushers do much more than just seat people, take up the collection, and stand watch in case of emergency. They are the "open doors" to fellow worshipers; they welcome each new arrival and point them towards Christ.

As with each year at this time, I take this time to thank the laity (Ministers of the Word and Sacraments), those who dedicated themselves to the Worship Services at Grace. They serve Grace Episcopal Church congregation with humility and grace. Their service to us is valued, treasured, and appreciated.

Outreach

Clergy and staff were able to provide financial assistance to several neighbors in tandem with financial services at BIM. Thank you for your continued generosity. Here is a little about the members of our ensemble:

Lindsey Weissman (singer):

Lindsey Weissman is a mezzo-soprano from Latham, New York, She moved to Houston last summer to pursue a Master of Music in Opera Performance & Pedagogy at the Moore's Opera Center at the University of Houston on a graduate assistantship, for which she teaches undergraduate music theory and aural skills. After receiving her Bachelor's Degree in Voice Performance and Theatre and a minor in Jazz Studies from Ithaca College in 2020, Lindsey worked with Oswego Opera Theatre, Opera Ithaca, and the Opera Company of Middlebury. She then had the privilege to spend a year as the linterim Head of Vocal Arts and Choir Director at South Seneca Middle and High School in upstate NY, where her musical aspirations were renewed and inspired by the joy and passion of her students. She continues to teach many of them remotely in her private voice studio, which has grown to include students from UH and the greater Houston community. This summer, Lindsey joined the voice faculty at Ithaca College for the prestigious Summer Music Academy for high schoolers. She also has an extensive background in dance and spends her free time finding yoga and ballet classes around Houston, fueling her newfound love of authentic Tex-Mex, reading British crime novels, and—one of her favorite parts of living in Houston—making music at Grace each week.

Brady Weldon serves as assistant choir director at Bellaire High School. An active member of the Houston choral community, Brady has sung with the professional choir, Cantare Houston, since 2017. Working in church music since he was sixteen, Brady brings a depth of experience in all forms of worship music. Brady holds a BM in Music Education from Stephen F. Austin State University, and a M.M.E in Choral Music Education from Texas State University.

Rob Erickson (percussion):

Rob Erickson is a jazz musician who joined Grace a year-and-a-half ago. He plays percussion in Grace's music ensemble.

Kate Moore (violin, viola, mandolin and percussion):

Like Schroeder in the Peanuts cartoons, Kate began picking out familiar songs at age 5 on a toy piano. At age 9, she began studies on piano and violin with Joy Plesner, of the Houston Symphony. Her other major teachers and mentors were Fredell Lack and Henry Rubin. After college, Kate played with Houston Ballet Orchestra, and with the opera under John DeMain. She then played under contract with the El Paso Symphony Orchestra, and the El Paso Pro Musica Chamber Orchestra for a number of years, enjoying the Southwest and its countryside and cuisine, and trips across the border after concerts. When family health concerns occurred, Kate returned to Houston and began free-lancing and teaching strings privately and also part-time at Stratford High School.

Other interests include cooking, reading, dance and fitness, hiking, community and church volunteer work, and spending time with family and friends. Kate has been married for 29 years to retired attorney and Yale Law School alumnus Roland Moore. They share a mutual love of people and places and hope to resume their travels and journeys sometime in the not-too-distant future.

Barry Sills (cello):

Barry Sills, prizewinning cellist in competitions in Germany, France, and Brazil, is also a recognized artist on baroque cello and viola da gamba. As a scholarship student at Yale he was the first recipient of the prestigious Maxwell Belding Internship Award given by the Yale School of Music and while still an undergraduate was teaching assistant to Aldo Parisot. He performed with the Saarlandisches Staatstheater in Germany and the Nouvel Orchestre Philharmonique of Radio France in Paris and also taught at the Conservatoire National de Boulogne-Billancourt. Performing widely in France and Germany, he also toured Japan for three summers with the New York Symphonic Ensemble. As a recitalist, he has performed on three continents, touring South America as an Artistic Ambassador, and he has been a touring artist for the Texas Commission on the Arts.

In Houston he performs regularly with Ars Lyrica Houston, Bach Society, and St. Cecilia Chamber Music. He was co-founder and artistic director of Camerata Ventapane which presented concerts in Houston and Mexico, and for six consecutive years he was artistic director of the Festival de Musica Barroca in San Miguel de Allende. He has been principal cellist of Houston Ballet and Houston Grand Opera since 2001.

Paul English (piano, music director):

Paul is an internationally recognized composer, recording artist, producer and educator. He has performed and recorded with such jazz greats as Dizzy Gillespie, Arnett Cobb, Kirk Whalum and David Liebman and he has arranged and produced a number of jazz and classical recordings, including a 2013 collaboration with country legends Willie Nelson, Ray Price and Johnny Bush...

He has composed three works for symphony orchestra and numerous chamber works as well as music for film, radio and stage. His sacred works include "The Gospel According to John Coltrane" for jazz quartet and choir (2007) and "Wrestling with My God" for choir and chamber ensemble, text by Gerard Manley Hopkins (1997). He has arranged a number of traditional, jazz and gospel hymns and has composed several of his own original hymns and other works on sacred texts.

Mr. English has served on the faculties of Texas Tech University, Sam Houston State University, San Jacinto College and Houston Community College. He is an alumnus of The University of Miami and The Shepherd School of Music at Rice University (B.M, M.M.), where he studied music composition with his friend and mentor, Dr. Paul Cooper.

Horace Alexander Young (saxophone, flute, vocals):

Horace Alexander Young III is a native Houstonian, international recording artist and renowned educator. He spent several years as a visiting professor at Washington State University and Santa Fe University of Art and Design before returning to Houston last year. As an accomplished jazz recording artist, he has performed with such greats as B King, Bill Withers, Freddy Fender, McCoy Tyner, Norman Brown and Toots Thielemans. He holds a Master of Music degree from Washington State University after studies at Texas Southern University and the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University.

Since joining our music ensemble, Mr. Young has blessed our worship services with the very moving sounds of his saxophone, flute and voice.

In 2023 we celebrated several special music presentations, a Shrove Tuesday Pancake supper with authentic live Latin jazz. Music in the Pumpkin Patch this fall brought our neighbors onto the pumpkin patch to stop and listen to the quarter. Our musicians provided Grace's participation in the Interfaith Labyrinth Service where people and musicians from several area faith communities gathered to pray for peace and unity in our world. All this and, of course, the very special music presentations at Easter and Christmas and special guest appearances by musicians from the community and from within our own congregation. What a wonderful year!

As Grace grows, so does our music program. And I feel and hope that the music program is and can be a continuing part of that growth. 2024 promises many great things for our church. Glad to be here! Thank you!
